Housing Affordability Fact Sheet 2020

The COVID-19 pandemic has exacerbated existing housing challenges faced by Virginians.

In Montgomery County, a person needs to earn \$16.77 an hour or an annual income of \$34,880 to afford a modest 1 bedroom rental and not be housing cost burdened.

In Virginia, a higher percentage of Black and Hispanic renter households are housing cost burdened (paying more than 30% of their income on rent) than white households.

Bristol RHA in District 9 receives HUD designation which will help lift our neighbors out of poverty.

Bristol Redevelopment and Housing Authority was recently designated as a US Department of Housing and Urban Development EnVision Center. Bristol RHA is one of four EnVision Center sites in Virginia, and the first rural site in Virginia. As outlined in a HUD May press release "HUD's EnVision Center demonstration offers assisted families support to help them achieve self-sufficiency and, thereby, making limited federal resources available to others awaiting assistance."



"The EnVision Center designation will allow us to expand and enhance our case management offerings to BRHA clients as well as to those in need throughout the greater Bristol communities. Under a nonprofit umbrella, we plan to work with our partners to be a 'one stop' resource combatting a generational cycle of poverty," says Bristol RHA Director, Lisa Porter.




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
Federal Resources and Program Income Limits in CD 9
